MUSEUM EXPANSION ADVANCES

We have made huge progress with the museum expansion project:

- ★ Fundraising has been a great success! A recent grant of \$350,000 and a generous donation of \$100,000 from a volunteer with HSL's collections project brings our funds raised to almost \$4.5 million to support the purchase of the building, architectural design, construction, and exhibits. - + Architectural design is almost complete, and tax credit paperwork is submitted. We are awaiting last approvals to be able to go out to bid for all phases of construction in the first week of the New Year.
- + Collections preparation is happening behind the scenes. Archivist/Curator Chessie Monks-Kelly is working with Museum Assistant Emily Banach to prepare to move and rehouse the collection and establish a research room.
- A new short film is in development to introduce visitors to the broader story of the new museum. The film is supported by the National Endowment for the Humanities.
 Filmmaker Jordan Craig has completed two of the three interviews for the film. We look forward to unveiling the new film in the coming spring!

STRATEGIC PLANNING

We are pleased to announce that Historic Saranac Lake has been selected to receive Strategic Planning Assistance through the Documentary Heritage and Preservation Services for New York (DHPSNY) Planning & Assessment Services. This grant will support our work with a consultant from NY Council of Nonprofits to create a new three-year strategic plan. HSL's last strategic plan was finalized in 2019, right as we made the decision to purchase the Trudeau Building and before the onset of COVID-19. COLLECTIONS

LAKE PLACID EDUCATION FOUNDATION GRANT

A generous grant from the Lake Placid Education Foundation is supporting our project to return the John Black Room to its original use as a library space. The grant is making it possible for us to catalog over 1,000 volumes in our book collection to make them available to the public in the John Black Room

GRANT FOR OVERSIZE MATERIALS

We were recently awarded a \$12,000 grant from the Northern New York Library Network (NNYLN) to help us safely rehouse oversize materials in our collection. Our collections staff and volunteers have been working to inventory and scan our oversize materials. This grant will allow us to purchase storage cabinets for a portion of our Branch & Callanan blueprint collection. It will also fund the purchase of supplies for a humidification chamber, allowing us to safely flatten paper-based materials that have been rolled for many years. Next, we will create catalog records for our oversize materials, including blueprints, photographs, artwork, and more. These records and scans will then be made available on our online catalog. PHOTOGRAPH PROJECTS

Our Archivist / Curator Chessie Monks-Kelly recently completed a two-year image cataloging project funded by the Institute of Museum and Library Services. This project allowed her to catalog over 2,000 photographs and postcards from our collection. This work was expanded thanks to a grant from NNYLN, allowing Museum Assistant Emily Banach to scan more than 5,000 images from our collection.
