

Preservation Celebration Scheduled for May 13



In May, HSL will host a day-long forum on architectural preservation featuring two workshops and a tour of the Hotel Saranac restoration project. Jack Alvarez of Landmark Consulting, LLC will lead a morning session on window restoration, giving a how-to demonstration and explaining why restoring wood windows is the energy efficient, environmentally sustainable, and economically sound choice. In the afternoon, Murray Gould of Port City Preservation LLC will present a session titled "Reviving Main Street." Mr. Gould will describe funding sources and strategies for downtown

restoration, with a focus on the commercial rehabilitation tax credit. The final program is a hard hat tour of the Hotel Saranac led by Kim Alvarez of Landmark Consulting. Ms. Alvarez has been working with Roedel Companies to nominate the hotel to the National Register of Historic Places and to define the restoration plan. Ms. Alvarez will share history about the hotel and details about the restoration. Admission to each workshop session is \$5. The window workshop is free to contractors. The hotel tour is free of charge but open only to attendees of one or both workshops. Space is limited and reservations must be made by calling HSL at 518-891-4606.

UPCOMING EVENTS & PROJECTS



HISTORY MATTERS SPEAKER SERIES

In May we will host our third annual "History Matters" free speaker series four Thursdays in May at 7pm in the John Black Room. Scheduled talks are:

May 8: "World War I: 100 Years Later" Brian Mann of North Country Public Radio will lead a discussion, a leadin to the reopening of our WWI exhibit on July 1.

May 15: "Images of America: Saranac Lake" Neil Surprenant will conduct a book signing and new presentation of images from his book.

May 22: "Frankenstein Lives! The Continuing Relevance of Mary Shelley's Novel" by Dr. Tim Madigan, Associate Professor of Philosophy, St. John Fisher College. A lead-in to the 2015 "Medical Marvels" exhibit, the talk explores our ongoing fascination with the mysteries of scientific invention.

May 29: "The American Arts and Crafts Movement in New York State" by Dr. Bruce Austin, Chairman and Professor of Communication at Rochester Institute of Technology. The talk is hosted in collaboration with the Lake Placid-North Elba Historical Society.

The last 2 programs are made possible through the support of the NY Council for the Humanities' Speakers in the Humanities program.



HISTORIC SITES ON SMARTPHONE

HSL is assisting Stacey Allott of Geomatics Land Surveying with a project of the Local Development Corporation to make information about area sites available on smartphones. A new application based on GIS technology will allow visitors to find out about local sites of interest including historic sites throughout the village.

PATIENT MEMORIAL WALL

Soon we will unveil a newly revamped patient memorial wall at the laboratory museum. Since the memorial wall was created, almost 100 bricks have been dedicated to patients who cured in Saranac Lake. Funds have supported lab cabinet replicas and building repairs. With the main section of the wall filled, we are opening the surrounding areas for patient names. Donations of \$100 are now being accepted for new brick dedications. A new informational brochure will be available soon.



2015 EXHIBIT: "MEDICAL MARVELS"

Work has begun on a new exhibit in collaboration with the Ripley's Museum and the Dittrick Medical History Center of Case Western Reserve University. A New York Council on the Humanities grant will support consultation with Dittrick Chief Curator, James Edmonson, Ph.D. and design and exhibit planning assistance of Karen Davidson of Davidson Designs. UPDATE ON RAILROAD CORRIDOR: The Trails and Rails Solution

The Trails and Rails Action Committee (TRAC) is a group supporting implementation of a rail with trail plan for the Adirondack Railroad, as outlined in the State's adopted 1996 Unit Management Plan. The goal is to establish a Park wide community-based trail system with the rails in place. TRAC has surveyed and designed prototype rail-with-trail cross sections and other aspects of a combined system. The approach aligns with New York's forward-looking policy of recognizing the value of existing infrastructure systems, and the need to build on them rather than demolish them. The HSL Board of Directors has stated its support for the preservation of the Adirondack Remsen to Lake Placid Railroad Corridor as a National Register resource. Documented contributing features of this designation include the rails, rail bed, buildings, and the equipment along the line. The board supports TRAC's positive solution to the current debate.
